DUES INCREASE DEEMED NECESSARY

At the May meeting, the Budget Committee reported on its review of our financial status including income from all sources, known and projected disbursements, and budget projections. Our yearly deficits of about \$15,000 to \$24,000 have been funded by about 20% of the earnings from the Trustees' investments. In 2008 however, the deficit exceeded \$24,000 while the investment earnings were significantly reduced because of value losses in the volatile investment world. The outlook for 2009 is even more severe.

Since our last dues increase was in 2004, and because of the current conditions just cited, the Budget Committee proposed a \$10 dues increase beginning with the 2009 dues year. This increase would reduce the deficit to about \$11,000, and retain more of the Trustee's lowered earnings.

This will be acted on at the June 12 meeting.

VENERABLE MASTER'S MESSAGE



The activity of the 2009 Spring Reunion is now history. And before us we see the opportunity for some leisure time and the pleasure of contemplation and study of the AASR degrees and their philosophical teachings. But for new Scottish Rite Masons (and even for old, experienced ones) the question immediately arises about where to begin and how to proceed. Given the voluminous materials associated with degrees of the Scottish Rite (Albert Pike's *Magnum Opus* and *Morals and Dogma* alone among his writings comprise over 1,700 pages) how does one devise and begin a program of personal study that will be both enjoyable and easily manageable.

In this regard, I can only offer some thoughts based on personal experience. First of all, don't attempt to study the entire body of ASSR materials all at one time. Instead, pick one degree (or a small number) and concentrate on them first. With time you can proceed to others. I recommended the SQ3R study methodology. Many of you may remember, that last year (after four consecutive computer/projector failures) I made a presentation on how to study a Scottish Rite Degree. I used the 24th Degree as an example. It was about a 30-page PowerPoint presentation with pictures and graphics. Thus, we don't have space to get it in the Bulletin. However, if there is

sufficient interest, I will try to prevail upon Ill. Jack Canard to help me find a way to make a “cut down” version available over our Alexandria AASR Internet Page.

I also suggest that any study of the Scottish Rite Degrees should have a structure and frame of reference. Joining the Master Craftsman Correspondence Program (MCCP) is an excellent way to accomplish that objective. Participation in the MCCP will allow one to quickly increase his knowledge of the Scottish Rite and its philosophy. It is an ideal approach for individual study or group study at the Valley level. For those interested in Masonic scholarship and research, I recommend joining the Scottish Rite Research Society. Members receive copies of *Heredom*, the annual transaction, and *The Plumblin* which is the Society’s quarterly newsletter plus an annual bonus book. For information go to www.scottishrite.org for the Society’s website. I always enjoy attending the Society’s meetings at the Biennial Sessions of the Supreme Council and the excitement surrounding those events and am looking forward to this year’s Session. And as a final thought for this Bulletin, I strongly urge each of you in the Alexandria Valley to carefully read *The Scottish Rite Journal* which you receive as part of your membership. I invariably read it from start (*The Grand Commander’s Message*) to finish (*Book Reviews*) by Ill. Jim Tresner, 33°, G.C.

SUPREME COUNCIL TO AWARD HONORS

At each Biennial Session of the Supreme Council (on odd numbered years) many brethren throughout the Southern Jurisdiction are elected to receive the KCCH and 33rd Degree honors. These are based on personal efforts and contributions by individuals that add to the effectiveness of the Scottish Rite. The number of 33rds is approximately 3 to every 10 KCCHs.

The Statutes of the Supreme Council prescribe the basis for allocating numbers to each Orient, and the SGIG distributes a number of each to the Valleys according to numerous factors.

In our Valley, the 33^o members meet to consider and collectively recommend to the SGIG those that he might consider most deserving to be **his nominations** to the Supreme Council. In both of these steps, there is *no commitment*; only the

Supreme Council chooses the selectees.

We should bear in mind that dedication to the Scottish Rite should be aimed at self-satisfying participation and enjoyment, and if an honor should be bestowed, then it would become a double personal reward. As provided for in the Statutes, any member directly or indirectly asking for an honor will be denied any future consideration.

This year's Biennial Session will be held (in Washington) on October 5 and 6. The Honors selections will be announced at mid-day on the 5th. We will eagerly look forward to learning of the Alexandria honorees, and to offer them our congratulations and best wishes for their further service to the Scottish Rite.

SPRING WORKSHOP

PROGRAM HONORING BLUE LODGES – AUGUST 22

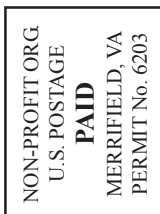
