# Personal Representative's Message

Three of the major benefits of being a Scottish Rite Mason are the increased opportunities for fellowship, the ability to participate in some very worthwhile charitable activities, and the availability of new avenues for Masonic education. In this message I want to focus briefly on the first two.

We may not think much about the advantages of Masonic fellowship, but few things contribute to depression more than social isolation and few things make life more satisfying than positive interaction with others. The Scottish Rite, through its Valley, committee, and degree team meetings, and its Scottish Rite Clubs, Reunions and social events, provides numerous opportunities to meet and interact with other Masons.

The Scottish Rite attracts people from many different backgrounds, occupations, and experiences. If we take the time to talk with them and get to know them, even just a little, we can learn something from every person we meet. This is a two-way street because the experiences that we have had, and lessons we have learned – which we often take for granted – can be interesting and valuable to others. Moreover, as a result of these various opportunities for social interaction, we will find people with whom we share a special bond and, in these cases, the relationship will grow from fellowship to friendship.

Masonic fellowship is, of course, different from non-Masonic interactions because of the obligations we have taken to help and support each other. This means that when we encounter difficult periods in our life and need encouragement, we should be able to count on our Brethren to provide a measure of help and support. By the same token, each of us needs to be sensitive to the problems that our Brethren are having, and reach out to them. This is so important because those who most need help often are unwilling or uncomfortable about asking for it.

If we take our obligations seriously, we should notice when our Brethren are not attending meetings, and try to find out the cause. We should be asking our Brethren how they and their family are doing, and we should be observant about their mood and demeanor. A phone call, a card, an e-mail, or a tweet can help show the Brother that he is not alone. Often, however, what is really important is the personal face to face interaction. Something as small as a smile, a hand on the shoulder or an expression of sympathy is all the

help a Brother may need. At other times your being there to talk with him and to empathize can go a long way. And sometimes the Fraternity may need to provide more substantial help.

Scottish Rite Masons not only deeply care about their Brethren; they are willing to extend themselves for others outside the Fraternity. Many of us have been affected by the economic problems of the last couple of years, but we know there are those who have suffered even more. To the extent we can, we might want to consider if we could spare a few dollars to help those in need. As we prepare for the coming holidays, we should think about those who will not be surrounded by family and friends and will have very little to be cheerful about. A small check to the Almoner's fund, to Rite Care, or to a local food bank could make a real difference in someone's life.

Finally, I want to thank all of the Brethren who have contributed so much this year to the Valley by their attendance, participation in the Reunions and on various projects, and in so many other ways. I know that some of those who have worked especially hard have been, or may in the future be, recognized by the Supreme Council. But our Valley ought to celebrate the contributions of its members.

To do so the Executive Council has adopted three new awards: The first is a Certificate of Appreciation for Scottish Rite Masons who have done something exceptional during the year. The second is a Certificate of Merit to recognize Scottish Rite Masons for outstanding service to the Valley over an extended period of time. The third is a Community Service Award Certificate for Scottish Rite Masons, non-Scottish Rite Masons, or non-Masons who have done notable community service.

I am sure that many of you may wish to nominate someone for these awards and I urge you to send your nominations to me. We will discuss and decide upon the 2010 awardees at the December Executive Council meeting.

As many of you know the Statutes of the Supreme Council call for an annual feast day in January. The Executive Council has decided that we will institute a January Feast banquet, under the purview of the Council of Kadosh, as the venue for our annual award banquet honoring the recipients of the Certificates of Appreciation, Merit, and Community Service for the previous year. This dinner will be prior to our Valley meeting on Friday January 14, 2011. Please be sure to mark your calendar soon, so you and your lady – and your friends – can plan to attend this event.

## Report on the Scottish Rite Conference

September 24-25, 2010

The Eighty-Sixth Session of the Scottish Rite Conference was held on September 24 & 25, in Lynchburg, VA, hosted by the Valley of Danville. It was a delight to see 16 members from the Alexandria Valley and 10 of their ladies present at this year's conference.

The Friday afternoon education sessions were conducted by Ill. Hoyt Samples, 33°, SGIG from the Orient of Tennessee. He presented two superb programs developed by the Supreme Council as part of a series of educational programs. The topics were *Mentoring – Turning Bystanders into Members*, and *The Masonic Cooperative Education Program*. The Education Committee will have the presentations available to post on the Valley web site. Every brother should read them as they provide a wealth of very timely and useful information which we all can use, not only in supporting our Valley, but in building Masonry in our Blue Lodges.

The business meeting of the Conference was held on Saturday and included a Necrology Service in remembrance of the brethren who laid down their working tools over the past year; reports on the Valley activities by the Valley VPs; remarks by the Grand Master of Masons in Virginia, MW William Earl Rorer, Jr., KCCH; remarks by the SGIG, Ill. James Dean Cole, 33°; and the election and installation of officers.

The next biennial Session of the Supreme Council will be held August, 20-22, 2011, at the Washington Hilton. The Valley VP from Richmond, Brother David Amstutz, KCCH, challenged the Alexandria Valley to see which Valley would have the greater number of Brethren completing the Master Craftsman Courses.

Following the Conference Session, the Annual Meeting of the Scottish Rite Foundation was held. The President gave a report on the work of the Foundation and its financial status.

Following the reports, Board Members were elected and then sworn in by Ill. Cole. Ill. Dave Morris, 33°, was reelected for another term as the Board Member for the Valley of Alexandria.

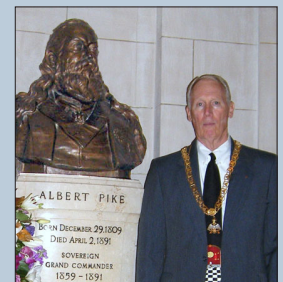
